A Frank Farewell

My father, Frank Sanders, will be stepping down from the pastoral leadership of The Center this October. He is now 80 years old and this retirement concept now looks appealing to him. For those of you who know Frank, it's so obvious that the word "retirement" was never a part of his vocabulary. Even at age 70 when he "retired" as Executive Director of The Center he could still work most of us under the table...physically and mentally. There are so many things we as a staff enjoyed about working with Frank. Perhaps one of his best traits is his ability to get things done. If you set out to do something with my father, it was going to get done. If there was a problem - he thoroughly enjoyed tackling problems - his determination, persistence, and tenacity, would always get us through it. I never saw him give up on anything. This of course generates some of our favorite Frank stories, but that's a whole other article. I can say this: When all was said and done you realized he had an uncanny common sense in unraveling complications. He was always willing to put himself front and center, stepping up to the plate one-hundred percent of the time...and that's just one of the things we like about Frank!

My mother and father have given much of their lives to this place. Mom and Dad first met in Charleston, South Carolina, at a dance. Dad was a third class petty officer on a destroyer in the Navy and my mother was a secretary to a captain of the naval base. They married in 1953 and moved back here to The Center in 1958. Dad was the Assistant Director working with my grandfather up until 1964. At that time Granddad "retired" (not really) and Dad took over the leadership of The Center. My brother and I grew up here and it was a unique childhood because we were always around lots of people...plus we had such a wonderful playground with the farm, the woods, the lodge and all the The Center's activities. My mother became very close to my grandmother and together they ran the Log Cabin Gift Shop. More importantly Mom and Grandmom added a touch of class to The Center keeping Dad and Granddad in check with some of their ideas. You know how that goes.

In 1973 when I was 14 years old, my family moved away from The Center and took up residence in Colorado. It was quite the adventure moving out west and leaving everything I had known behind. As a family, we tightened up and became more focused. Instead of living on 78 acres I now lived in a small house! Mom and Dad were home at night - keeping an eye on me I suppose. Dad found work as a realtor in Longmont, Colorado. He became very successful at it over a period of ten years and things were going well. I graduated from high school in 1977 and went off to college. Then one day in 1983 my mother and father received a letter from one of The Center's board members asking them if they might consider coming back to The Center. It's funny how things work in life. My father's inclination was to turn this offer down. It was my mother who convinced him to go back and take a look, which he did. Things were in disarray here at that time due to a number of factors. The bottom line however was that The Center was failing and in serious jeopardy of closing its doors. Dad and Mom spent some time thinking about it and then made the life-changing decision that...The Center was where they were truly needed and worth working for. In 1983 they moved back here with the intent of bringing this place back to its original vision and purpose. There was much work to be done.

During the next five years my mother and father became a formidable team. They had worked together before – but this time was different – this was a difficult mission with several serious challenges to overcome. Sometimes in life you’ve got to bring every last thing you have to the table to make it work. To coin a phrase, they had “the right stuff” at the right time to do the job...experience, age, wisdom, energy, determination, and a plan. They worked tirelessly, and with the help of a few key staff members, slowly but surely brought this place back to a successful and productive state.

I came back here in 1992. From 1992 – 2000 I spent eight wonderful years working with my father as the Assistant Director. I know I’m a little biased but he genuinely is a great man to work with. In 2000 dad “retired” as Executive Director and I took his place. Frank continued to be the Pastoral Director of The Center, leading Vespers for the next ten years. He also became the “Head Pot Stirrer” as we fondly call him. Every place needs someone to stir the pot and he is certainly the most qualified to do that job! He never knew what retirement meant and personally I am so glad he’s like that. He and Mom have been such a big help to me and a tremendous asset to this place. I never wanted either of them to retire – their advice, experience, and wisdom are irreplaceable. In 2008 Dad looked at me one day and said “Start looking.” I knew what he meant and I honestly never once considered looking until the day he told me.

How do you go about replacing Frank Sanders? Well the answer is simple – no one will ever replace Frank Sanders. I think all of us would agree he is one of a kind. There are people in this world though that can start where he has left off and build new avenues of spiritual growth. After all, this is a place built upon countless people who gave of their time, care, and thought, making things a little better for the next generation to improve upon. That is a great strength of ours. We have continued to grow for three generations and the honest efforts of those before us are not discarded, they are nurtured and made better.

I know God is present here, for the day Frank told me he really wanted to retire already in our midst was the person who could and would continue this ministry. Her name is Chris Hopkins and she had come to us following our request to lead a bible study class here at The Center. I went to her bible study class and then followed her into another class, Brian Swimme’s “The Hidden Heart of the Cosmos.” I really enjoyed Chris’ approach to spirituality and theology. I at the time had been talking to several ministers and putting some feelers out...and then one night it just dawned on me...Chris was the person we were looking for. The thought of it really surprised me and I can tell you when I approached her she was just as surprised too. But low and behold, after Chris gave it some thought she concluded that it was a perfect fit for her spiritual journey and calling. Chris was more than qualified with a Masters in Divinity from the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago and extensive ministry experience with the Catholic Church. We have never looked back from that day...only forward. Chris Hopkins was ordained here at The Center on May 23, 2010. She will fully take over the pastoral leadership of The Center this October with Frank’s and all of our blessings. She is vibrant...she is following her heart...and we are so happy she is here.

All of us wish Frank and Blanche the very best in their official retirement. We are so grateful for their presence every day. And just so you know...Frank will always be around here...He is still riding his horse...He is still working for mom in the garden. (Ha!)...He is still Head Pot Stirrer...and He still gives the best hugs!

Sunday, September 12, beginning with 4:30 p.m. Vespers.

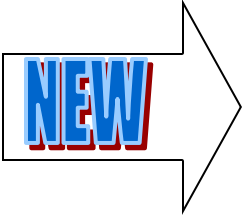

"Criticize by Creating" Michelangelo

I hear a lot of people complaining about the world today: too much violence, not enough money, too many kids out of control, the Cubs are terrible-- fear, anxiety and depression are everywhere. On top of that, the people who are complaining the most don't seem to recognize that their complaining adds to all the negativity in the world! I can not disagree with *some* of what they find so disagreeable and difficult, but after the first recognition of the issue or problem, I have never found complaining to be of much value. So what can a person do?

There are two suggestions that I personally have found helpful. The first comes from a Catholic Sister, Mary Jo Leddy who works with Asian refugees in Canada. To paraphrase her words: Be careful how you fight, for you become what you fight. If you fight against injustice, hate and violence you become that, just from "the other side of the fence" so to speak. But if you fight for justice, love and peace....that is what you become. Wise words which have been proven true in my experience.

The other suggestion is what Michelangelo said: "Criticize by creating." And what better place to learn how to express your creativity but the Center???. Now, I can hear some of you saying: "but....I'm not creative! I don't have artistic talent!" It is true that not all of us are a Michelangelo, but each of us has the capacity to create. Remember beauty is in the eyes of the beholder! And creativity can take many forms. Some do have a more innate sense of artistic expression. Some are better cooks than others. Some folks create relationships (human to animal or person to person) more easily than others. Some folks have a green thumb or an eye for design, construction or mechanical things.

But there is not a person alive who can *not* create *something*.

Some theologians have said that "creating" is God's job description. When we create something we are expressing our God-given nature. We allow the Holy One to be made known through us. We become "co-creators" with God. We allow God's Spirit to flow through us to create goodness, kindness, compassion, forgiveness, Love and beauty. When we create from our hearts and through our souls, goodness results, peace of heart and mind happens, Love is made visible.

Whether you come to the Center to learn a new art form, seek out the lost and the lonely to create a new relationship, or create a healthier relationship within your own soul and psyche, may you know that whatever is created, offers the doorway to greater peace, as well as a deeper connection to the Creator of us all. Whatever you do, enjoy the process, celebrate the result, and give thanks for the opportunity!

The Log Cabin Center for the Arts: 15 years and flying higher...

As we approach another September, I always feel it's good to take stock of how we're doing in the art center. I begin with a look back to 1995...

Fifteen years ago, we expanded the art program, creating the "Log Cabin Center for the Arts." We began with an open house in early September. We had a schedule of classes to offer: pottery, basketry, weaving, watercolor, some folkarts workshops, and kids' art. We had 2 beautiful new classrooms in the former gift shop, and 2 spiffed-up classrooms in the former "craft cabin." After months of planning, we were so nervous going into that open house, and so thoroughly elated when dozens of people showed up, looked around, and got in line to register for the fall classes! I went home that day thinking "Yes! This art center is going to fly!"

And we're still flying! Of course, there are times when the ride is bumpy. We don't always soar, but we have grown from that first autumn's small schedule to what the Illinois Arts Council (IAC) recently called "a hidden gem" of the Illinois arts community. Of course we had over 60 years of tradition upon which to build. Elizabeth Sanders had begun teaching weaving in the 1930's, and in the 1960's, a small art program thrived in what became known as the craft cabin. But Frank Sanders had a vision of a burgeoning art center, and in 1995 decided to move the gift shop to other quarters, and create a larger space for art.

We now offer over 25 classes every week, plus a variety of workshops, retreats, demonstrations, and other programs. Each week we see nearly 200 students. Saturday mornings are filled with the excitement of 6 children's classes. We have a beautiful new building and amazing new lapidary studio. We are trying to build an outdoor wood-fired kiln, and have just purchased a beautiful new indoor electric kiln (the first new kiln we've ever owned, thanks to a generous contribution in memory of former art teacher Barbara Fish). Most importantly, we have an amazing community of teachers, artists, students, and hostesses. A student said to me recently, "What did I do before I found the art center? All my friends now are folks from here. I can't imagine my life without this."

However, we have occasional days with empty classrooms, occasional classes with empty seats, occasional classes in need of volunteer hostesses, occasional ideas for new classes in need of instructors. So we're still growing---which means we still have room for YOU! So I encourage you to sign up today for an art class---or, at least just stop in for a visit---you'll want to join when you see what's happening! Check out the art schedule in this newsletter, or visit The Center website or The Log Cabin Center for the Arts Facebook page, to keep tabs on what is going on. Because what's going on is a soul-touching, fun, exciting, creative, artistic, beautiful journey for all of us.

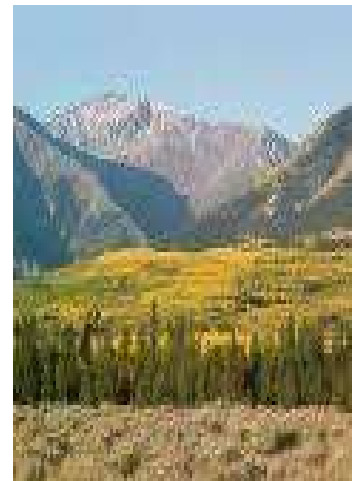
Tuesday, September 21: International Day of Peace

helped the children. I've enjoyed the Center for years and it will always have a place in my heart.

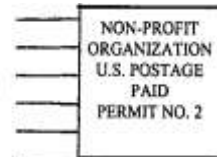
