Steps, Paths, Journeys

Pathway to Sobriety is The Center's onsite longterm recovery program. At any given time, about twenty men are working on their recovery on our gorgeous grounds. This includes men in phases one and two of the program as well as Pathway alums who work full time here. In phase one, Pathway men live here and work in the kitchen, in maintenance, or on the Farm. Phase two men live here and work full time elsewhere, preparing for rich, full lives beyond The Center.

You work your way through Pathway. You cannot pay with dollars or use medical insurance for your stay here. We provide room and board, one-on-one and group counseling, fellowship and laughs, love and connection and nurturing and support, a natural setting that God provides and we all take care of, and the best environment for recovery I have seen anywhere.

Pathway is 12-step based. I want to go into that a bit. I respect and follow the traditions of 12-step programs and hope to impart that respect and knowledge to all who care to listen, especially and specifically to the Pathway men. One of those traditions is to maintain personal anonymity at a public level, which means in this context that I cannot name a specific 12-step program to which I belong, but can mention that I am a 12-step member in general. With that in mind, here is a way to break down and generalize the 12 Steps:

- —Don't Use.
- -Trust God.
- -Clean House.
- -Help Others.

Working the 12-steps following the approach above has saved my life. More importantly, I've seen this approach save hundreds of other people's lives. Let me drill down those eight words above a bit: "Don't Use." In place of "use," you might have heard "drink," or "drug" or "gamble" or something else, but the proscription in any of these cases is useful and necessary in the case of addictive behavior. In my experience all these types of behaviors stem and blossom from being self-centered and the proscription above could also be positively stated as "Be other-directed." "Trust God" involves building a relationship with a higher power by praying and meditating. Cleaning house means taking personal inventory and apologizing to people we offend. Helping others is self-evident, but can become tricky if we're doing that only because we always expect something in return.

All of these things can be measured by behavior: Am I helping others or not? Am I taking inventory or not? Am I praying and meditating or not? Please notice, too, that this approach leaves plenty of room for us to choose a higher power of our understanding, to figure out a way to do our inventories, to find a path to help others. None of these things can really be done without being other-directed. All human beings are susceptible to addictive thinking. Take substance abuse out of the mix and my question is Who wouldn't this approach help in living a well-rounded life?

I do know that it helps the men of Pathway. The most amazing part of my job is getting to see this working in real time in their lives. I also see it working in the lives of the many others that they touch in the course of their recovery, during their stay and when they come back to visit. I often see it more quickly and more fully than they themselves do. I hope it is obvious that their work, their love, their horsing around, their focus, their example, helps me in my recovery. So, to the Pathway guys and everyone who supports them, let me say something I can't say too much: *Thank you*




