# "The Choice to Surrender Is the Road to Hope"

As Easter approaches, we look to the Resurrection of Christ for some semblance of hope especially against the backdrop of the uncertainty and unpredictability of our current culture...But we do ourselves a disservice by skipping over Jesus' Crucifixion. What lessons are there for us to learn if we were willing to take a closer look at suffering...His and ours?

No one relishes the experience of pain. In fact, we do our best to avoid it. But Jesus took a different approach when challenged by the hardness of life. He didn't deny the reality of trials by running away from them nor fight against them by strategizing a military plan as expected. Jesus had a way of walking the middle line in a way that showed both His humanity and divinity. His anguish in the Garden of Gethsemane proved His humanness, and His motive for dying proved God's Love.

Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice by surrendering His will and choosing to trust His Father based on the relationship they shared. From our human perspective, it looks like His crucifixion was a death marked by defeat. But if we look from God's perspective, we will see that His death was actually bookended by life on both sides...creation and resurrection.

Our own suffering seems to target us as trauma victims, but do you know where the real wound lies? Peter Levine, a renowned psychologist and trauma specialist, says that "The deeper pain comes not from what happens to us, but what we hold inside in the absence of a compassionate witness". Whether that witness is the God who we can't see or the feeling of being alone in our suffering, neither perception is grounded in truth.

Then what truths can we extract from suffering? Although we can't change what has happened to us, we can always choose our perspective. Suffering has a way of softening our defenses and increasing an awareness of our desperate need for God. When we realize that sheer willpower isn't enough to free or heal us from pain, it provides an opportunity for us to open our hearts to God, so we can reframe our experiences from His perspective.

And it's His perspective that cultivates an inner peace which can be experienced in the midst of hard times. We may be powerless to change our challenging circumstances, but we can always choose to trust the One Who is the strength in our weakness. Jesus is the One who empowers us to live the Life He died to give...a Resurrection life that is lived from the inside of us, so we can love the others on the outside. Easter reminds us that the victory over suffering has already been won...let's embrace the hope Christ and His mercy still brings.

# Spring is Here!

One of the most magical sounds in the Palos woods is the call of the Illinois chorus frog. As the first native frog to emerge from winter's sleep, it begins calling from our sloughs and wetlands in the evening, proclaiming that spring has arrived! Soon, wildflowers will carpet the forest floor, basking in the sunlight before the canopy of oaks, hickories, and maples fills in with leaves. With food once again abundant, the mating season for our wildlife is in full swing. It's a breathtaking transformation that we are lucky to witness every year.

Spring officially begins when the sun's most direct light crosses the equator, creating equal day and night across the globe. This is known as the northern spring equinox. The first Sunday after the first full moon following the equinox marks Easter Sunday, the most significant holiday in our Christian tradition. We invite you to celebrate with us at our 91st Easter Sunrise Service on our beautiful chapel hillside. This ecumenical service welcomes all and celebrates Christ's presence in our lives. Afterward, join us for fellowship and our traditional hot cross buns in the Great Hall of the Lodge. While the walk up the hill to the chapel is long, April offers a stunning journey as wildflowers blanket the forest floor. In addition to our 12:30 pm service, we also hold an 8:30 am Sunday service in the Lodge.

Spring also brings a full schedule of outdoor farm programs at The Center. Our farm is now open every weekend for families to visit. This year's newest arrivals – baby pigs, goats, calves, chicks, and ducklings – are eager to say hello! Our farm animals love spring as much as we do. We also offer engaging outdoor programs for children, including Junior Farmers, Barn Buddies, and Farmers-in-Training, all of which introduce young people to the wonders of a real working farm.

With the start of our farm tour season, we welcome preschool and elementary school children for hands-on experiences with our animals. We're always looking for volunteers to help guide these tours! Come spend a morning or afternoon leading children into each animal pen, where they can see, touch, and interact with the animals up close. No experience is necessary – we provide all the training, camaraderie, and friendship you'll need to become an expert tour guide!

Finally, a heartfelt thank you to everyone who supported our camp scholarship fundraising efforts. Thanks to your generosity, we are able to provide \$60,000 in scholarships this year, giving local children and teenagers in need the opportunity to attend our outdoor summer camp. These campers will spend their days riding horses, hiking, exploring creeks, camping under the stars, and singing around the campfire – all within The Center's beautiful 78 acres of nature. Your support makes these life-changing experiences possible, and we are truly grateful.

As spring unfolds around us, we invite you to take part in all the beauty, connection, and community that this season brings to The Center. Whether you join us for Easter service, visit the farm, or volunteer to help young explorers experience nature, there's a place for everyone to get involved. We look forward to celebrating the wonders of spring with you and welcoming you in the coming weeks!

#### Wednesdays April 2 and 16, 7:00pm-9:00pm



#### Container Gardening Sunday, April 27. 2pm-3:30pm

Weather permitting, the class will be held outdoors at the farm garden. Learn what you can grow in containers in your yard, or on your patio or balcony! Children's Farm gardener Lois Lauer has been experimenting the past few years to see what will grow well in containers. The answer: all kinds of veggies (potatoes, tomatoes, sweet potatoes, onions, peppers, zucchini, cucumbers, squash, garlic, and also herbs) in all sorts of containers (big flower pots, old recycle containers, simple wooden boxes, and cloth grow bags). Learn the basics of drainage, soil nutrients, watering needs, space needs, and more). The class will conclude with each participant receiving a 10 liter woven mesh grow bag of rich soil and their choice of a tomato, pepper, or cucumber plant plus a parsley, basil, or dill herb to companion plant beside their vegetable. The cloth grow bags have two handles which make them very movable. Container gardening is an easy way to be a green-thumbed successful gardener!

**Luncheons** run from 12 noon until 2 p.m., cost \$36 per person, and offer a delicious meal and the best in entertainment and educational programming.




#### Tuesday, April 1 "The Most Important Story You Will Ever Tell Is The Story You Tell Yourself" with Jenny Riddle

# Farm & Nature Discovery School

Spring is here and we a loving the beautiful weather. With the change in seasons, it is the perfect time for us to learn about The Garden and all things that live and grow within. We will be on the hunt for insects and spiders outside while also learning about how they contribute to helping a garden grow (or not!) We will learn all about bees and pollination, worms irrigating the dirt, and spiders eating invasive insects.

We will go bird watching and practice identifying the names of the different types we see while also exploring how they live, fly, and hunt. Our students will be growing plants and flowers in the classroom and at Acorn. They will also go on nature walks to find different wild flowers growing on our property.

This is also a good time to talk about what we can grow in the garden to eat! We will taste different foods that are commonly grown in gardens and explore different recipes that use foods from the garden. We may also try honey comb while learning about how bees make honey!

We will also celebrate Easter together as a school! We will be having Easter parties in our classrooms and going on a school Easter Egg Hunt outside. Each student will bring a carton of plastic eggs filled with treats and toys. Then they will use the carton to hunt for 12 different eggs from their friends! It is so fun to watch the children work together to find the hidden eggs. The Easter parties are also a great way to celebrate the coming of spring!

April is Arab American Heritage Month! Our teachers will explore the Arab American culture, contributions to the US. and history throughout the month of April. According to The Westport Library's article Arab American Heritage Month: Celebrate, "An estimated 3.7 million Americans have Arab roots, according to American Institute. the Arab ancestries traced to 22 countries in the Middle East and North Africa, including Lebanon. Egypt, Palestine. Syria, Morocco, Iraq, Jordan, Yemen, Bahrain, Tunisia, Algeria, Sudan, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates and others." 



#### "The Choice to Surrender Is the Road to Hope"

As Easter approaches, we look to the Resurrection of Christ for some semblance of hope especially against the backdrop of the uncertainty and unpredictability of our current culture...But we do ourselves a disservice by skipping over Jesus' Crucifixion. What lessons are there for us to learn if we were willing to take a closer look at suffering...His and ours?

No one relishes the experience of pain. In fact, we do our best to avoid it. But Jesus took a different approach when challenged by the hardness of life. He didn't deny the reality of trials by running away from them nor fight against them by strategizing a military plan as expected. Jesus had a way of walking the middle line in a way that showed both His humanity and divinity. His anguish in the Garden of Gethsemane proved His humanness, and His motive for dying proved God's Love.

Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice by surrendering His will and choosing to trust His Father based on the relationship they shared. From our human perspective, it looks like His crucifixion was a death marked by defeat. But if we look from God's perspective, we will see that His death was actually bookended by life on both sides...creation and resurrection.

Our own suffering seems to target us as trauma victims, but do you know where the real wound lies? Peter Levine, a renowned psychologist and trauma specialist, says that "The deeper pain comes not from what happens to us, but what we hold inside in the absence of a compassionate witness". Whether that witness is the God who we can't see or the feeling of being alone in our suffering, neither perception is grounded in truth.

Then what truths can we extract from suffering? Although we can't change what has happened to us, we can always choose our perspective. Suffering has a way of softening our defenses and increasing an awareness of our desperate need for God. When we realize that sheer willpower isn't enough to free or heal us from pain, it provides an opportunity for us to open our hearts to God, so we can reframe our experiences from His perspective.

And it's His perspective that cultivates an inner peace which can be experienced in the midst of hard times. We may be powerless to change our challenging circumstances, but we can always choose to trust the One Who is the strength in our weakness. Jesus is the One who empowers us to live the Life He died to give...a Resurrection life that is lived from the inside of us, so we can love the others on the outside. Easter reminds us that the victory over suffering has already been won...let's embrace the hope Christ and His mercy still brings.
