The Land

I've spent most of my life here at The Center. As a young boy, I grew up playing at the farm, exploring the woods, and riding horses. My first horse was a pony named Coffee, and I rode him everywhere around the property. Eventually, Dad let me graduate to the bigger horses and ride beyond the farm. We would explore all throughout the woods, but our favorite destination was riding down the railroad tracks to Pooches for a milkshake. When trains came, we'd scramble up or down the embankment, depending on where we were. I don't think you could do that today. But it was a different time- gone all day, no cellphones, just out exploring the world.

For twenty years, I lived out west. I came back in 1992 to become the Assistant Director of The Center. As I revisited my childhood haunts, I realized things weren't quite as vast as I had remembered. The woods that once seemed endless, the acres of farmland- now they feel like an island surrounded by suburbia. But still, what a beautiful island. The older I get, the more I appreciate this land. The Center is incredibly lucky to be nestled up against the woods of the forest preserve. Our chapel, main lodge, art center, and camp buildings all back up to a mile of deciduous forest, filled with 150-plus-year-old oaks and hickories. Across the street lies another sixty acres of farmland, fields, wetlands, and woods. It is indeed a precious place.

I have my favorite spots. The pine forest is one of the most peaceful. The trees were planted as tiny sprigs in 1955 to grow Christmas trees. When I was a boy, we rode horses through the young pines and you could see over the tops. Now they tower thirty to forty feet tall, creating a magical, quiet place.

Indian Hill is another favorite. In spring, we would hunt for arrowheads in the freshly plowed furrows, where the winter rains had washed the soil and exposed flint pieces. Indian Hill is long believed to be a Potawatomi hunting camp. So many flint chips were found there in the early years- likely remnants from crafting arrowheads. It's the perfect spot: high above the creek valley, great for hunting. The fire ring has been there for as long as I can remember. In the 1960's, campers on their first night were treated to my father, dressed in full Native attire, riding up on horseback. He would toss handfuls of flour from his leather pouch into the fire, sending flames shooting skyward. Thousands of campers have gathered around that fire. Really, all our campers, over eighty years' worth- have been there, many of them multiple times.

Now, as I look back on all these memories, I realize just how deeply this place is woven into who I am. Though time has changed the world around it, the spirit of The Center endures. It remains a place of wonder, quiet adventure, and of deep-rooted connection. I am grateful to have grown up here, to have returned, and to be a part of its story still. This land shaped me, and I can only hope that it continues to shape others- for another eighty years and beyond.


