Executive Director's Comments from Annual Meeting 2025

November 9th, 2025

Good afternoon, and on behalf of myself, the staff, and the Board of Trustees, I extend to you a warm and heartfelt welcome to The Center's ninety-third Annual Meeting.

The Center began humbly in 1932, born from a dream held deeply by my grandfather. Here on these wooded hillsides, that dream took root – and for nearly a century, it has continued to unfold into the rich and multifaceted ministry we celebrate today.

Through all these years, we have remained steadfast to the guiding principles laid down four generations ago: to be a place of love and service to all who come here; a place of peace; a place of healing in both body and spirit; and a place that nurtures growth and gives room to grow.

Over the decades, thousands have walked through our doors seeking comfort, strength, and renewal – and they have found a community of compassion, care, and support. Each of you gathered here today is part of that living community. You are the strength and foundation that makes all things possible, as together we strive to walk in the footsteps of the Master.

It has been one of the greatest honors of my life to serve as Executive Director of this extraordinary organization for the past twenty-five years. Before that, I had the privilege of serving for eight years under my father's leadership as Assistant Director. Through those years I have been blessed to work alongside people of remarkable dedication and goodness, and to form friendships that I will always hold dear.

Three generations of the Sanders family have helped guide this ministry through its ninety-three years of service. There was, however, a ten year period – from 1973 – 1983 – when no Sanders was here. During that time, five executive directors came and went. I believe they struggled because they were not homegrown. The Center has a deep and unique culture – one built upon empathy, patience, second chances, goodness, and shared ownership – a culture that takes years to truly understand and embody.

In May of 2025, I informed the Board of Trustees of my intention to retire as Executive Director in December of 2026. I feel the time has come to entrust the leadership of this organization to someone younger – someone who will carry this ministry forward with new energy and vision.

That person is Mrs. Amy Donze.

Amy's roots at The Center run deep. As a young girl, she spent much of her time here, where she formed a special bond with Kermit, the farm's beloved pony. She even brought Kermit to an Annual Meeting once, sharing with everyone how much joy he had brought into her life. She was just twelve years old at the time – a moment many of us still remember fondly.

After earning a degree in Business Marketing, Amy quickly realized her heart belonged not in the corporate world, but here, in the work of service and growth that defines this place. By providence, there was an opening for Farm Director – and from that moment we met on Indian Hill for her interview, I knew she was a perfect fit.

That was nineteen years ago. Since then, Amy has served with distinction as Farm Director, then Camp Director, and now as Program Director overseeing all of our programming. She created Pumpkin Playland, launched our SAGE program, and developed numerous outreach and marketing initiatives. During the challenges of the COVID years, she provided steady leadership, guiding our camp and school programs safely through uncharted territory.

Amy is smart, innovative, compassionate, and – most importantly – deeply committed to the values and principles of The Center. She is, without question, “homegrown.”

The Board of Trustees has unanimously endorsed my recommendation that Amy become the next Executive Director of The Center.

The Center's Nominating Committee presented the following nominees at the last Annual Meeting to the Board of Trustees held on November 9, 2025. These individuals were voted in for a term of three years. Please give them a warm welcome.



John Schabes was elected for his first three-year term on the Board of Trustees. John graduated with honors from Governors State University in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in business. He returned for a second bachelor's degree in accounting, graduating in 2005 with high honors and completing his certification as a Certified Public Accountant shortly thereafter. He is currently employed as a Director at Forvis Mazars in Chicago helping companies and individuals with their outsourced accounting needs. He is also a member of the Dean's Leadership Council in Governor States College of Business and serves as a mentor to their accounting students. Regarding his service on the Board of Trustees, John states "It is an honor to give back to this wonderful organization and help them fulfill their mission."

Stephen Greene was elected for his second three-year term on the Board of Trustees. Stephen, and his wife Cindy, live in Oak Lawn, Illinois. They have two adult children, Scott, and Dana. Stephen's first experience at The Center was when his daughter Dana joined the 4H Club sponsored at the Children's Farm in 2003. It was not long before he and his wife Cindy started to volunteer at the farm. The more they volunteered, the more they knew that the Children's Farm was a very special place. Steve met Dave Sanders while volunteering for one of the festivals and Dave explained to Steve the entire mission of The Center. He began to realize his volunteering at the farm supported the whole mission. Steve states, "The Center holds a very special place in my heart." His favorite part of volunteering is driving his 1946 Farmall tractor for hayrack rides. He loves talking to the visitors about The Center and its many activities. Stephen, now retired, worked forty-two years for Aerospace Tool and Die as a quality manager. He also spent twenty years as an adjunct instructor at Moraine Valley Community College teaching auto-cad. Steve served on the Oak Lawn High School Board of Education from 2012-2016. He is a very dedicated volunteer and has been a wonderful addition to The Center's Board of Trustees.





Rea Bulgum was elected for her first three-year term on the Board of Trustees. She has over 15 years of leadership experience in nonprofit operations and human services. She currently serves as Senior Director, Development Operations at Brookfield Zoo, where she oversees the Operations Team responsible for gift processing, donor database management, reporting, and administrative functions that support fundraising and engagement efforts across the organization. Previously, she held leadership roles at Volunteers of America of Illinois, providing programmatic leadership in foster care and veterans' services. She also has a long-standing connection to The Center through her son's participation in the Children's Farm camp programs, where both have volunteered, and has dedicated more than a decade to coaching youth soccer- reflecting her deep commitment to children, families, and community engagement.

Sharon Woodcock was elected for her second three-year term on the Board of Trustees. Sharon has a strong background in business, marketing, and sales. Her career started with Ace Hardware Corporation as a merchandiser increasing sales from 13.7 million to 149 million within four years. Sharon is a three-time recipient of the President's Award in 1989, 1990, and again in 2011 for True Value Company. She also has volunteered with the H Foundation in LaGrange, Illinois raising funds for cancer research for Northwestern Hospital. Sharon found The Center in 2018 through Chris Hopkins. Sharon's mother fell ill in 2018 and Rev. Chris came and prayed with them several times before her passing in April 2018. Sharon states, "I knew I had to get involved with The Center after meeting Chris!" Sharon volunteers in many areas of The Center, including our rummage sale and running our Fellowcrafter's Gift Shop in the Lodge. She regularly attends Vespers services and has been a wonderful addition to our Board of Trustees.



Create a mosaic with a heart design on a 6x6-inch wood board while using stones and tile pieces. On the second day of class students will add grout to finish their piece.




PAPERMAKING WORKSHOP: VALENTINES Instructor: Marilyn VandenBout
